CAPE MAY DEDICATES HOGGATT PAVILION

June 19, 2006 WILMINGTON, OH - Cape May Retirement Village today dedicated The Galen J. and Elizabeth D. Hoggatt Pavilion on its campus at 150 Cape May Drive, Wilmington, Ohio. A crowd of more than 70 friends and associates gathered to thank Cape May resident and donor Galen Hoggatt, whose gift made the outdoor pavilion possible and to honor Mr. Hoggatt's wife, the late Elizabeth Hoggatt.
